The Reverend Dr. Lillian Doloris Anthony, 88, passed away on June 26, 2014.

Dr. Anthony was a member of Central Presbyterian Church, she was a graduate from Lincoln University in Jefferson City, Missouri, and received her Master of Religious Education from Pittsburgh Theological Seminary, Pittsburgh, PA, retired from Presbyterian Church USA as Associate for Equal Employment Opportunities Affirmative Action.

Dr. Anthony transformed her home into the first African American Heritage House Museum which was founded in Louisville, Kentucky.

She is survived by her brother Marshall Anthony, Los Angeles, CA.

A Memorial Service will be held in her honor on Friday, July 11, 2014 at 11:00 AM at Central Presbyterian Church, 318 West Kentucky Street, 40203
